We received 15 applications, advanced 7 to the final review, and ultimately selected 3 deserving winners. Our success was driven by strategic outreach to schools, consistent communication with applicants, and seamless collaboration among our members and volunteer judges.



Speaking of judges, our panel boasts a diverse range of experienced professionals, including a teacher, a businesswoman, and a nurse, embodying a rich tapestry of career paths.

The Award Presentation during our March meeting was truly memorable. All three deserving recipients, accompanied by special guests, joined us as we presented each woman with her prize money and a stunning Soroptimist Bracelet, generously donated by one of our members. Here are our winners:

- First Place: Bethany DuBois from Fayette County Career and Technical School, pursuing LPN/Midwifery. Notably, Bethany's application will advance to the next round of judging for the Northeast Region LYDA.

- Second Place: Jakaya Settles from Citizen School of Nursing, pursuing an Associate degree in Nursing.

- Third Place: Candice Jones from Westmoreland County Community College, studying Heating Ventilation, Air Conditioning, and Refrigeration (HVACR). We were honored to have one of our judges join us at the meeting, experiencing the full circle of the LYDA process from applicant judging to award presentation—an invaluable moment indeed.

Programs of Service

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The Programs of Service Committee remains committed to its initiatives, "Period Positive" and "Transition Coaches." Recently, the committee completed a second distribution of feminine hygiene products to five additional school districts. For the 2023-2024 academic year, members distributed a total of 79 packages of sanitary pads and 62 packages of tampons, providing 3378 sanitary napkins and 2510 tampons to 2929 girls across ten school districts. These efforts extend to various types of schools, including public, vocational-technical, and parochial, as well as a neighboring school in Greene County. SI Fayette takes pride in ensuring that girls have free and confidential access to these essential products.

Meanwhile, Transition Coaches continue to engage with young girls in our community. Through discussions focused on identifying interests and building self-confidence, members foster meaningful connections with the girls. Activities such as creating tied blankets further strengthen these bonds and the rapport is evident. Looking ahead, the committee plans to invite professionals from career fields of interest to inspire and educate the girls on potential career paths.









The Programs of Service Committee is dedicated to sustaining these vital projects and invites interested members to join in these meaningful initiatives.

OSTEOPOROSIS WALK

On April 6, 2024, Soroptimist of Fayette County, in collaboration with Dr. John Sunyecz, proudly sponsored the Osteoporosis Walk at Mount Saint Macrina. Despite the chilly weather, eleven dedicated Soroptimist sisters braved the elements to participate and proudly represent our group. Together, we stood united in raising awareness for osteoporosis—a cause close to our hearts.

Osteoporosis affects millions worldwide, with an estimated 200 million women suffering from the condition globally. In the United States alone, over 10 million individuals are diagnosed with osteoporosis, and another 44 million are at risk due to low bone density. Shockingly, osteoporosis causes an estimated 8.9 million fractures annually worldwide, translating to one fracture every three seconds.
